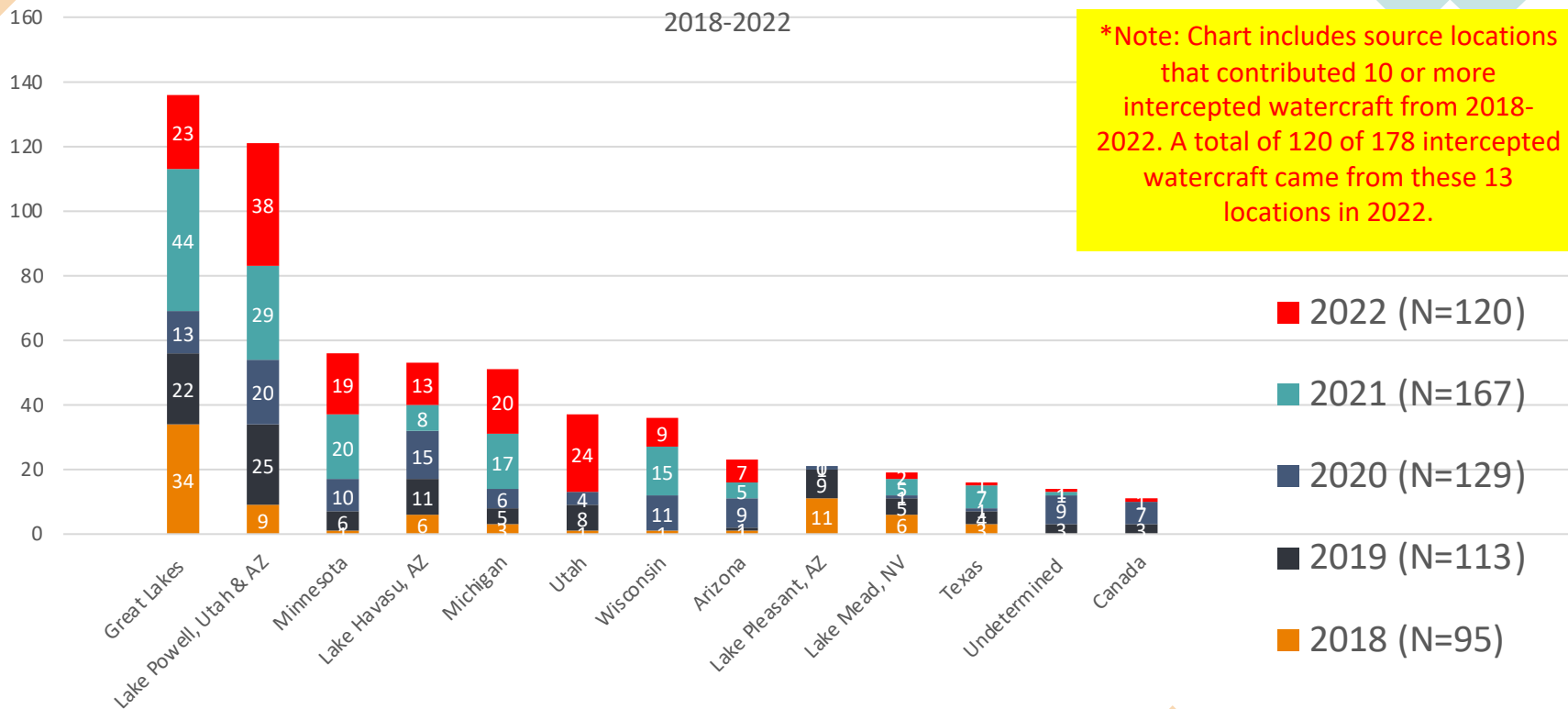

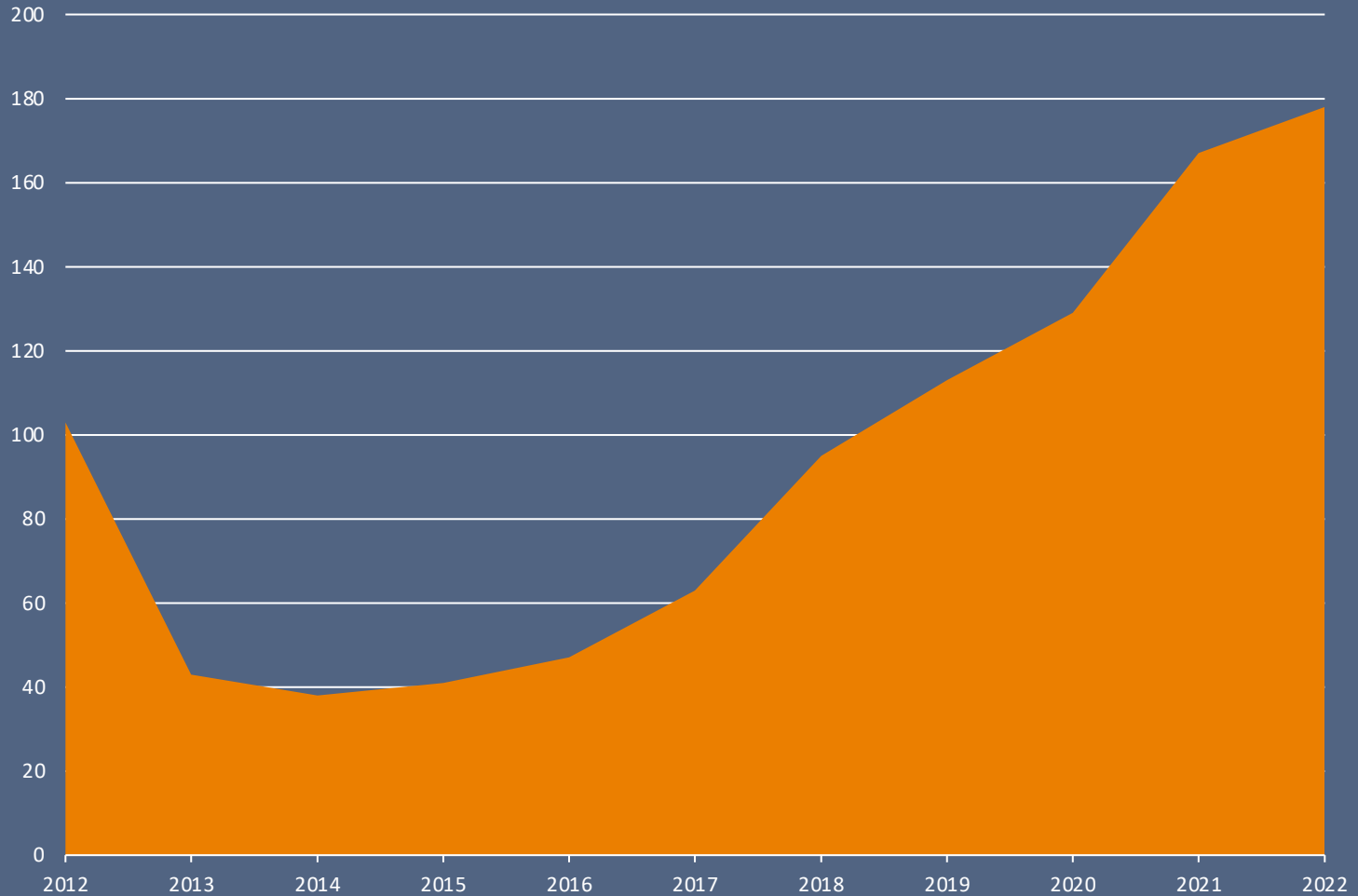


Watercraft Inspection and Decontamination by Source

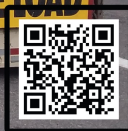
Why is This Important?

Call Before You Haul prevents unnecessary delays for you and your customers and ensures you will not be violating state or federal laws pertaining to unlawful transport of invasive species.

Prevent Delays

Aquatic invasive species hitchhike on boats, trailers, and motors in both visible and hidden locations. Trained professionals will inspect and certify your boat to prevent costly delays.

A commercial trucking company, or hauler, may be held legally responsible for violations of state law and the federal Lacey Act if a company driver is intercepted hauling a vessel infested with quagga or zebra mussels. Boat brokers may also be held liable if the broker contracts with an independent contractor to haul a contaminated watercraft across state lines. **Save yourself costly delays - Call Before You Haul** to ensure your destination state can provide you with the services needed to inspect your cargo. One toll-free call notifies all four western states.

New Program Aims to Prevent Aquatic Invasive Species Spread

The Pacific States Marine Fisheries Commission (PSMFC) initiated a new program to prevent delays during the transport of watercraft destined for the states of Washington, Oregon, Idaho, and Montana. The program, "Call Before You Haul," provides a toll-free phone number boat transporters can call prior to transporting watercraft from outside the Pacific Northwest to one of the aforementioned states. The program is currently being piloted in 10 states and is intended to be expanded to all states in 2022.



By calling the toll-free number, 1-844-311-4873, prior to hauling, and providing some basic information about the watercraft being transported, the destination state representative will reach out to boat transporters and provide them with information to facilitate and expedite the watercraft inspection process, and if needed, decontaminate. Proactively arranging watercraft inspections can prevent costly and timely delays at inspection stations, or if boat transporters are intercepted hauling an infested vessel by law enforcement. All four states are communicating with one another and working with one of the four states will expedite transport across two or more Pacific Northwest states.

All Pacific Northwest states have regulations that make it illegal to transport aquatic invasive species (dead or alive) within their respective states, including penalties up to, and including, a no bond felony. Much of the ongoing spread of aquatic invasive species (AIS) to inland waters throughout North America can be attributed to the overland movement of watercraft that can be towed on trailers or atop vehicles. Invasive species can be carried in bilge water, live wells, and bait buckets as well as on boat and motor exteriors and trailers. Every time a boat is transported overland after use in an infested waterway, there is the possibility that it will transfer aquatic invasive species to uninfested waterways.

In addition to reaching out to boat transport companies, PSMFC is working directly with Departments of Transportation in 10 states (as part of the pilot program) to notify them of the toll-free number and make this information available on their permitting websites.



Western States and Provinces Best Management Practices to Comply with State/Provincial Laws and Prevent the Spread of Aquatic Invasive Species

Prevent Delays and Reduce Costs Associated with Transporting, Buying, and Selling Boats

Aquatic invasive species, such as zebra and quagga mussels, pose a threat to the economy and natural resources of western states and provinces. In addition, fines and costly delays associated with transporting boats with aquatic invasive species can affect you and others in the recreational boating industry.

In an effort to prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species, the Pacific States Marine Fisheries Commission, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Western Regional Panel, and others are making information on state laws and best management practices available to boat haulers, auctioneers, marinas, manufacturers, and brokers to make it easy to comply with state, provincial and federal laws, prevent costly delays in transporting or selling boats, and help reduce the spread of aquatic invasive species.

A few key facts you should know:

It's the Law!

A U.S. federal law, called the Lacey Act, makes it illegal to transport invasive species regulated by federal or other jurisdictional laws into the U.S. and across state and international borders. In addition, the western states and provinces have enacted legislation to reduce the spread of aquatic invasive species. Businesses and individuals have been cited for transporting boats into and through western states and provinces with invasive mussels attached, resulting in costly fines and significant delays.

CLEAN, DRAIN, DRY

If you follow these three simple steps, your chances of experiencing any delays or fines associated with transporting or selling a boat are minimized. A Clean, Drained, and Dry boat has no plants or animals attached and is not carrying water in its wells,

ballast, or engine. Most states have drain plug laws – any boat out of water should have a pulled drain plug.



Communication Prevents Delays

The western state and provincial AIS coordinators know the laws and regulations for their jurisdictions, and they're available to assist you by informing you of their laws and providing you with any other tools and information you need to successfully transport a boat, or sell/auction a boat, particularly those coming from water bodies infested with aquatic invasive species. A commercial trucking company, or hauler, may be held legally responsible for violations of state law and the Federal Lacey Act if a commercial driver is intercepted hauling a vessel. Inspect brokers may also be held liable if the broker contracts with an independent distributor to haul a contaminated watercraft across state lines. **Call Before You Haul** to ensure your destination state can provide you with the services needed to inspect your cargo. One toll free call meets all 48 western states.

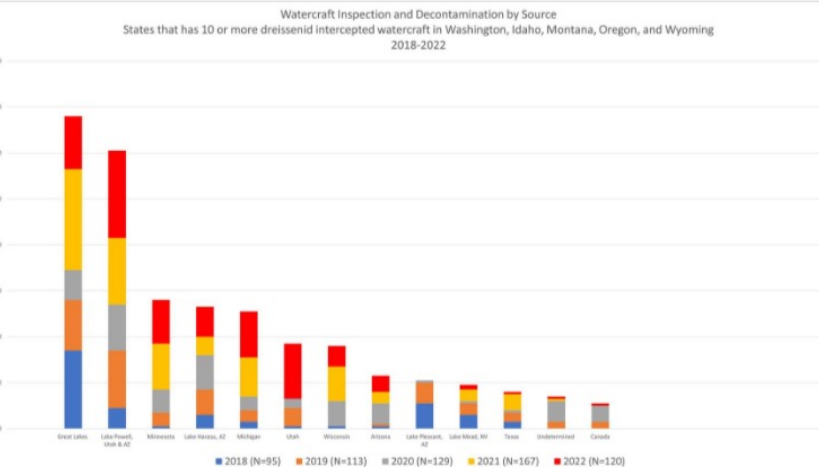

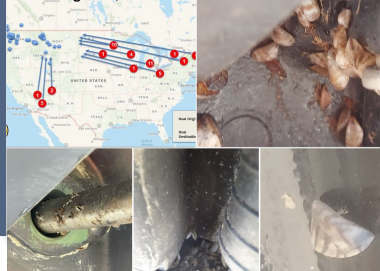

The Pacific States Marine Fisheries Commission (PSMFC) has issued a program to reduce the risk of transporting watercraft from outside the Pacific Northwest to other states. The program, Call Before You Haul, provides a toll-free number boat transporters can call prior to transporting watercraft from outside the Pacific Northwest to other states. The program is currently being piloted in 10 states, and is intended to be expanded to all states in 2023.

PSMFC created Call Before You Haul to prevent costly and time-consuming boat sales and boat transportation compliance money-related access restriction fees. All Pacific Northwest states have regulations that make it illegal to transport aquatic invasive species (AIS) or AIS-infested watercraft from one state to another, and including an AIS boat launch. Most of the ongoing spread of aquatic invasive species (AIS) is blamed within the Pacific Northwest. AIS can be introduced by the continued movement of watercraft that can be loaded on boats, transporters, trailers, and other equipment. AIS can be transported from one state to another, and then to other states. Early AIS detection is important to prevent the spread of AIS. It is important to know the possibility that AIS can be transported outside other calls in an infested area.

By calling the toll-free number, 1-844-311-4873, prior to hauling and providing some basic information, you can help prevent the spread of AIS. The program is currently being piloted in 10 states and you can provide you with information to facilitate and expedite aspects of the watercraft, and if needed, decontamination. Making a positive approach to making arrangements for inspection of the watercraft can prevent costly and time-consuming delays, and if you are interested in hauling an infested watercraft and all four states are communicating with one another, this, working with one of the four states will expedite transport across two or more Pacific Northwest states.

In addition to reaching out to boat transport companies, PSMFC is working directly with departments of transportation in 10 states as part of the pilot program to study the effectiveness of the program. DEPARTMENT AUTHORITY

The Department may, at its discretion, authorize oversize permits exceeding the provisions of [UCA 72-7-406](#) for non-divisible loads over approved routes.

Note: When operating under an oversize non-divisible permit and carrying a divisible load, the load may not exceed legal divisible dimensions (14' high, 8'6" wide, 53' trailer). For instance when transporting a divisible load, such as lumber, on a 10' wide trailer, the lumber is a divisible load and may not exceed 8'6".

BOATS/WATERCRAFT

Carriers hauling boats and/or watercraft must comply with U.S. Federal Law regarding transportation of invasive species across state and international borders. U.S. Western States and Canadian Provinces have enacted legislation to reduce the spread of invasive aquatic species. Businesses and individuals can and have been cited for transporting boats into and through western states and provinces with invasive mussels attached, resulting in costly fines and significant delays.

Boat transporters Call Before You Haul boats across state lines to avoid delays at 1-844-311-4873.

On July 1, 2020, Iowa law eliminated over-dimensional permits for hay, straw, stover, or bagged livestock bedding. Legal dimensions for hauling these are 12 ft 5 inches wide, 14 ft 6 inches high and 80K with legal axle weights.

- 213 calls into hotline*
- Significant reduction of calls not relative to purpose of hotline
- Extensive social media engagement with boat transporters
- Extensive engagement with state departments of transportation and AASHTO

***Note:** 2023 will be the first year that boat transporters are notified in advance of purchasing their annual interstate hauling permits.

- Last waterbody

What Happens After You Call?

The destination state will contact you to ensure your boat is inspected, and if necessary, decontaminated, before or upon arrival to its destination.

Why is This Important?

Call Before You Haul prevents unnecessary delays for you and your customers and ensures you will not be violating state or federal laws pertaining to unlawful transport of invasive species.

Prevent Delays

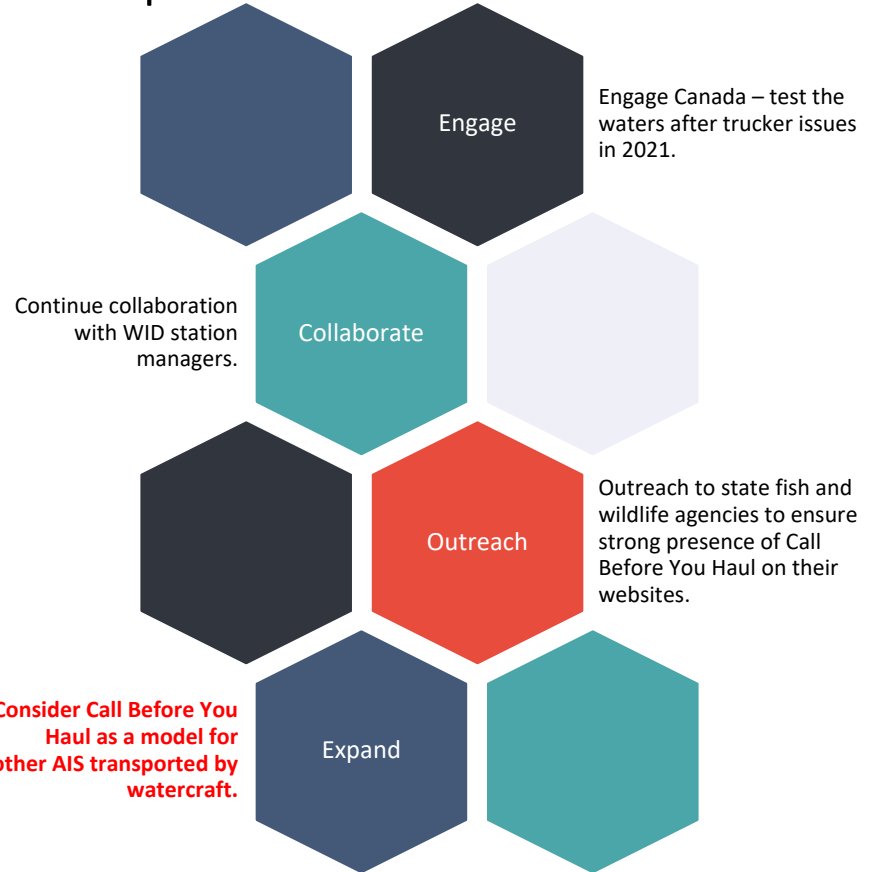
Aquatic invasive species hitchhike on boats, trailers, and motors in both visible and hidden locations. Trained professionals will inspect and certify your boat to prevent costly delays.

A commercial trucking company, or hauler, may be held legally responsible for violations of state law and the federal Lacey Act if a company driver is intercepted hauling a vessel infested with quagga or zebra mussels. Boat brokers may also be held liable if the broker contracts with an independent contractor to haul a contaminated watercraft across state lines. Save yourself costly delays - **Call Before You Haul** to ensure your destination state can provide you with the services needed to inspect your cargo. One toll-free call notifies all four western states.
